Here at YHIS, the safety and wellbeing of our students are top priorities. We believe it is our obligation to implement and diligently uphold the Child Safety policies and procedures in our school.

What is Child Safety?

Child Safety comprises a set of policies and procedures designed by LifePlus to be implemented in all LifePlus affiliated schools. These policies and procedures are designed to keep all students under our care safe to the



greatest extent possible. They also work to uphold healthy boundaries and encourage accountability in our school. Every year, our staff undergo training to recognize potential signs of any child safety issues. They are also required to read through all safety materials and agree to uphold them. Every adult, whether staff or volunteer, who works or helps in our schools must be trained in this area before they are allowed to begin their position.

What are Child Safety Leads?

At every LifePlus school, there are Child Safety Leads whose responsibility is to ensure we always prioritize Child Safety and wellbeing. These individuals work in pairs to educate staff about our Child Safety policies, respond to any potential issues, and encourage an environment of accountability.

The Child Safety Leads at YHIS are Arden Ning (Secondary Science) and Brook Liu (Elementary Teacher). We sat down with our Child Safety Leads this week to get their perspective on what child safety means to them and for our school.
